The owner wanted the new high school facility to have a collegiate feel. We created this by focusing on a large open student commons area that had two distinct spaces. One area is a more traditional dining commons, while the other is more of a gathering space with a variety of seating options for students to study in groups or individually. Colors and materials were chosen to showcase not only school pride, but new modern amenities and learning trends that are finding their place in regional facilities.

Particular attention to graphics were given in the common spaces and gym, but also intricately detailed in simple spaces like the corridors. The mural of Panthers (the school mascot) in the gym was designed around light fixtures for the eyes, which glow green when the gym is dark and the home team makes its way on to the court.

The design of the space incorporates 21st century learning trends, specifically focusing on the areas of collaboration, critical thinking,

> communication and creativity, Creating a flexible learning environment for all students that was conducive to various teaching methods was of the utmost importance.

This new building is attached to the existing facility, allowing the existing space to now be used for middle school grades exclusively.
