


Ursuline Academy Early Learning Center

New Orleans, LA

After Hurricane Katrina, the Ursuline Academy laundry building was transformed into an innovative early learning center, recognized for both its unique curriculum and synergistic design process. Working closely with the school's administration, teachers, and staff, the design team developed both curricular and architectural concepts modeled after Reggio Emilia principles. Multifunctional, flexible spaces allow for exploration and discovery while the biological forms and sacred geometries encourage self-guided learning. Bright colors and dynamic shapes engage students in a three-dimensional textbook they enthusiastically liken to Disney World.

The feature space is the double height Studio where colorful volumes and a reading loft are nestled beneath a canopy of undulating wood elements, suspended lights, and painted ductwork. Learning labs arranged around a "Town Square" create an educational village while movable partitions and sliding barn doors enable reconfiguration for different activities. The lobby includes color changing lights and functions as a gallery for student artwork. Outside, a new entry tower and drop-off pavilion reference architec-











tural elements of the historic campus.

The overwhelmingly positive feedback from teachers, students, and parents testifies to the project's success in pro-

viding a stimulating, enriching learning environment and demonstrates the value of user engagement during the design process.
